What is the Office of Justice Programs?

- The Office of Justice Programs (OJP) provides grant funding, training, research, and statistics to the criminal justice community.
- OJP is one of three grantmaking components of the Department of Justice along with the Office on Violence Against Women (OVW) and the Office of Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS).

The Second Chance Act (SCA)

Signed into law in 2008

Category 1: Performance-based and Outcomesbased Contracting for Reentry Services

Category 2: Performance-based and Outcomesbased Contracting for Permanent Supportive Housing



Purpose of the SCA Pay for Success Initiative

Support state, local, and Tribal governments to use performance-based or outcomes-based contracting to enhance or implement clinical services and other evidence-based responses to improve reentry, reduce recidivism, and address the treatment and recovery needs of people with mental health, substance use, or co-occurring disorders who are currently involved in the criminal justice system or were formerly involved.

Pay for Success Initiative: Objectives

- ✓ Enhance or establish **performance-based and outcomes-based contracts** to provide individualized reentry services or PSH for people leaving incarceration or previously incarcerated who are identified through a **validated risk tool** as being at moderate to high risk to reoffend.
- ✓ This includes building capacity to complete related activities:
 - Regular performance and outcome reviews and validation.
 - Outcomes validation.
 - Incentivizing payment approvals and results.



Category 1 Focus Areas

- ✓ Enhance or establish individualized reentry services for people leaving incarceration and assessed as medium or high risk to recidivate.
- ✓ **Deliver individualized services based on risk and needs** identified through a validated criminogenic risk and need assessment tool.
- ✓ Include a range of performance-based or outcomes-based reentry services contract elements (see solicitation for details).
- ✓ Ensure government staff and service providers have adequate training on performance-based or outcomes-based procurement, reentry services, data collection, and outcomes validation.



Category 2 Focus Areas

- Enter into contracts to provide evidence-based, high-quality permanent supportive housing (PSH) to formerly incarcerated individuals who have a substance use disorder.
- Manage the performance-based or outcomes-based PSH contract, including data collection, performance and outcome reviews, monitoring, performance and outcomes validation, and incentive payment approvals.
- Ensure government staff and service providers have adequate training on performance-based or outcomes-based procurement, PSH, data collection, and outcomes validation.

Examples of Potential Programs (Existing Grantees)

Permanent supportive housing and case management for "familiar faces" / frequent utilizers of multiple public systems of care Provision of comprehensive cognitive behavioral reentry services to high-risk young men to address trauma and improve employment and other outcomes

Expansion of a model permanent supportive housing program for people leaving DOC custody to serve new areas of the state

State governments, special district governments, city or township governments, county governments, Native American Tribal governments (federally recognized)

Proposal Abstract

Proposal Narrative

Budget Worksheet and Budget Narrative (Web-based Form)

Application for Federal Assistance (SF-424)

See the grant solicitation for more details.



Proposal Abstract

Include a summary of the purpose of the project, primary activities, expected outcomes, the service area, known intended beneficiaries, and subrecipients.

Write it in the third person for a public audience, as it will be publicly available on the OJP website if the project is awarded.



Proposal Narrative—Things to Note

Description of the issue

- Service provision capacity in the relevant category.
- Any past efforts to enter into performance/outcomes-based contracts.

Project design and implementation

- Identify needed data sharing agreements.
- Memorandums of understanding/agreements and a description of partnerships with one or more correctional agencies, if the correctional agency is not the lead applicant.
- · Description of requested priority consideration.



Proposal Narrative (cont.)





Grantee Deliverables

- An analysis that demonstrates reentry service or PSH need using data indicating the number and needs of people to be served.
- An analysis that demonstrates the performance targets or outcomes selected for payment.
 - Contracts must include recidivism performance targets or outcomes.





Grantee Deliverables (cont.)

- An analysis that demonstrates the grantee's decision about the performance-based or outcomesbased contract structure, repayment strategy, and timing of payments.
- An action plan consisting of dealstructures, outcomes-based strategies and key indicators, and revised milestones for this award.





Grantee Deliverables (cont.)

- Revised contract term report
- Final report that documents the intervention, outcomes, and lessons learned





Review Criteria

Statement of the Problem/Description of the Issue (15%) Project Design and Implementation (35%) Applications that meet the basic minimum Capabilities and Competencies (25%) requirements will be evaluated by peer reviewers on: Plan for Collecting the Data Required for this Solicitation's Performance Measures (15%) **Budget (10%)**

▲ SAM.gov Entity Validation Update ℰ

GSA implemented a new process to validate an entity's legal business name and physical address when requesting a Unique Entity Identifier (UEI) and for completing a SAM.gov entity registration. Due to a high volume of requests, entity validations are taking longer than expected to process. This validation process is now taking 7-10 business days, and in some cases longer.

OJP strongly recommends starting your SAM.gov registration process as soon as possible to allow the time necessary to process entity validations well in advance of the Grants.gov due date posted in the solicitation. Read this FAQ for more information.

The Office of Justice Programs (OJP) Grant Application Resource Guide ("Guide") provides guidance to assist OJP grant applicants in preparing and submitting applications for OJP funding. It addresses a variety of policies, statutes, and regulations that apply to many (or in some cases, all) OJP program applicants, or to grants and cooperative agreements awarded in fiscal year (FY) 2023. Some OJP programs may have program solicitations that expressly modify a provision of this Guide; in such cases, the applicant is to follow the guidelines in the solicitation as to any such expressly modified provision.

- **Step 2**: Submit the full application, with attachments, at <u>JusticeGrants.usdoj.gov</u>.

NOTE: Submission deadline times for both Grants.gov and JustGrants are now 8:59 p.m. ET, not 11:59 p.m. ET as in past years.
