## What is the Office of Justice Programs?

- The Office of Justice Programs (OJP) provides grant funding, training, research, and statistics to the criminal justice community.
- OJP is one of three grantmaking components of the Department of Justice along with the Office on Violence Against Women (OVW) and the Office of Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS).

## The Second Chance Act (SCA)

Signed into law in 2008

Second Chance Reauthorization Act in 2018





## SCA: Improving SUD Treatment and Recovery Outcomes for Adults in Reentry

Support state, local, and tribal governments and community-based nonprofit organizations to establish, expand, or improve treatment and recovery support services for people with SUDs during incarceration and upon reentry into the community.



## Program Goal and Objectives

Improve outcomes for adults with SUDs or co-occurring substance use and mental health disorders who are reentering communities following a period of incarceration.

## Improving Family-based SUD Treatment in Prisons

## Applicants must:

- Integrate techniques to assess the strengths and needs of the incarcerated parents and their extended family.
- Ensure that each participant has access to consistent and uninterrupted care if transferred to a different correctional facility.
- Locate services in an area separate from the general population of the prison.



## **OJP Priority Areas**

- Priority Considerations Supporting Executive Order 13985, Advancing Racial Equity and Support for Underserved Communities Through the Federal Government
- Implement or expand access to medications for SUD combined with counseling and behavioral therapies.





## **Examples of Potential Grant Programs**

Partnership between a state or local corrections agency and nonprofit SUD treatment provider to provide pre- and post-release SUD treatment. Partnership between a community supervision, corrections agency, and nonprofit SUD treatment provider to enhance gender-responsive treatment and reentry supports for women with SUDs on community supervision.

Partnership between pretrial services and a nonprofit SUD treatment provider supporting identification and connections to care for people with SUDs who are in pretrial status.



## **Proposal Abstract**

Include a summary of the purpose of the project, primary activities, expected outcomes, the service area, known intended beneficiaries, and subrecipients.

Write it in the third person for a public audience, as it will be publicly available on the OJP website if the project is awarded.



## **Proposal Narrative**

Description of the issue

#### Project design and implementation

- Memorandums of understanding/agreements and a description of partnerships with correctional agencies, only if the correctional agency is not the lead applicant.
- Description of requested priority consideration.

#### Appendix A: Mandatory Treatment Service Provider Certification: Provider Licensing/Accreditation/Certification Documentation Requirement

All collaborating service provider organizations listed in this application meet applicable licensing, accreditation, and certification requirements.

As the authorized representative, I also understand that the following information is required to receive funding, and these materials have been included with the application materials:

  will be provided from every service provider organization listed in the application that has
  agreed to participate in the project.
- Documentation that all service provider organizations collaborating on the project have been providing relevant services for a minimum of 2 years prior to the date of the application in the area(s) in which services are to be provided. Official documents definitively establish that the organization has provided relevant services for the last 2 years.
- Documentation that all collaborating service provider organizations are in compliance.
  with all local (city, county), state, and tribal requirements for licensing, accreditation, and
  certification or official documentation from the appropriate agency of the applicable state,
  tribal, county, or other governmental unit that licensing, accreditation, and certification
  requirements do not exist.

**Note:** Official documentation is a copy of each service provider organization's license, accreditation, and certification. Documentation of accreditation will not be accepted in lieu of an organization's license.

A statement by, or letter from, the applicant organization or from a provider organization attesting to compliance with licensing, accreditation, and certification, or that no licensing, accreditation, certification requirements exist, does not constitute adequate documentation.



#### OJP Grant Application Resource Guide



#### ▲ SAM.gov Entity Validation Update ℰ

GSA implemented a new process to validate an entity's legal business name and physical address when requesting a Unique Entity Identifier (UEI) and for completing a SAM.gov entity registration. Due to a high volume of requests, entity validations are taking longer than expected to process. This validation process is now taking 7-10 business days, and in some cases longer.

OJP strongly recommends starting your SAM.gov registration process as soon as possible to allow the time necessary to process entity validations well in advance of the Grants.gov due date posted in the solicitation. Read this FAQ for more information.

The Office of Justice Programs (OJP) Grant Application Resource Guide ("Guide") provides guidance to assist OJP grant applicants in preparing and submitting applications for OJP funding. 
