What is the Office of Justice Programs?

- The Office of Justice
 Programs (OJP) provides
 grant funding, training,
 research, and statistics to the
 criminal justice community.
- OJP is one of three grantmaking components of the Department of Justice along with the Office on Violence Against Women (OVW) and the Office of Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS).



FY 2024 Smart Reentry: Housing Funding

Estimated number of awards: Up to 7

Maximum award amount: Up to \$1,000,000

Performance duration: 36 months



Purpose of the SCA Smart Reentry: Housing Demonstration Program

Support state, local, and Tribal governments to enhance or implement evidence-based activities or services to improve reentry and reduce recidivism by expanding and/or increasing access to housing for people who are currently or formerly involved in the criminal justice system. Prior to the release of incarceration, individuals will be screened, assessed, and identified for program participation. The program will help jurisdictions assess their reentry systems, identify strengths and gaps, and then build capacity for improving housing options for adults released from prison or jail.



Smart Reentry: Housing Demonstration Program: Goals

Increase safe, healthy, and affordable housing options for people in reentry **by**

Develop, implement, or test strategies to expand housing options, including

Working at the system level

Working at the individual level

Assessing and amending system-level policies and practices

Keeping the experience of the people impacted by the system in clear focus



Objectives

- 1. Provide safe and affordable housing for individuals involved in the criminal justice system.
- 2. Provide an adequate supply of stable short-term and/or permanent housing services that appropriately meet the needs of individuals returning from incarceration.
- 3. Reduce barriers and promote access to secure, safe, and stable housing opportunities for individuals involved and/or formerly involved in the criminal justice system.
- 4. Provide wraparound services (e.g., substance abuse treatment, mental health treatment, intensive case management, money management, etc.) to individuals involved in or formerly involved in the criminal justice system to ensure continuity of care.



Focus Areas

- ✓ Applicants may propose evidence-based or innovative reentry housing models.
 - Stand up new or expand existing models of reentry housing.
 - Propose other projects that remove barriers and increase access to housing options for individuals returning to communities from prison or jail.
- ✓ All approaches should contemplate access to wraparound services to address common needs of people in reentry as well as policies and practices that take those needs into account to facilitate successful tenancy for participants.
 - Examples of wraparound services: substance abuse treatment, mental health treatment, intensive case management, etc.
- ✓ This program will promote greater equity in service delivery by ensuring adults in reentry have access to providers who are culturally competent and accessible in their home communities.



Focus Areas (cont.)

- ✓ Projects should consider best practices and models that ensure housing stability for participants in reentry.
 - Example: The Housing First approach prioritizes stable housing placement without preconditions such as treatment engagement and completion, employment, case management, and other conditions.
- ✓ Examples of housing models that may be explored:
 - o **Permanent Supportive Housing:** long-term rental assistance with supportive services.
 - o Rapid Re-Housing: short- and medium-term rental assistance and supportive services.
 - Transitional Housing: temporary housing up to 24 months with supportive services.
- ✓ Demonstration projects must include services that begin prior to release from incarceration and continue into participants' return to the community.
 - Pre-release services may include a reentry housing needs assessment and the identification of suitable participants for this program.

Examples of Potential Programs

Permanent supportive housing demonstration program to test and develop the partnerships and system necessary for people returning to their community from a state or local corrections agency

Rapid re-housing that quickly moves people returning from incarceration into housing, connecting them with employment, with services tapering as stability is achieved

Short-term rental assistance or transitional housing coupled with supportive services, acting as a bridge to permanent housing



Examples of Potential Programs

Partnership between state or local corrections agency and a state or local housing agency to align assessment, referral/in-reach, and funding resources for emerging or evidence-based housing interventions for people returning

Partnership between state or local corrections agency and a state or local housing agency to reduce barriers to existing housing options for people returning


Eligible Applicants

State governments, city or township governments, county governments, other units of local government, such as towns, boroughs, parishes, villages, or other general purpose political subdivisions of a State, Native American Tribal governments (federally recognized)

Public housing authorities/Indian housing authorities



Application Requirements



See the grant solicitation for more details.



Proposal Abstract

Include a summary of the purpose of the project, primary activities, expected outcomes, the service area, known intended beneficiaries, and subrecipients.

Write it in the third person for a public audience, as it will be publicly available on the OJP website if the project is awarded.



Proposal Narrative—Things to Note

Description of the issue

- The size and scope of the reentry housing challenges, their relation to recidivism and the target population, and response efforts to date
- A baseline recidivism-reduction goal

Project design and implementation

- Memorandums of understanding/agreements and a description of partnerships with one or more nonprofit, public, private or government funding agencies (e.g., HUD, Medicaid, etc.).
- Description of plan to engage reentry task force with key stakeholders (e.g., local housing authorities, private and government agencies) to explore funding opportunities and lower barriers to housing
- Description of requested priority consideration



Proposal Narrative (cont.)

Capabilities and competencies Plan for collecting required data on performance measures Timeline for project goals, objectives, and deliverables



- Deliverable 1: Convene or Engage a Task Force
 - Engage a reentry task force or similar body to examine policies and practices related to housing gaps and needs for the reentry population, and barriers to successful housing placements for formerly incarcerated people.





- Deliverable 2: Action Plan
 - Complete a Planning and Implementation Guide provided by BJA and the TTA provider that addresses gaps and deficits identified in the task force review and defines a reentry program focused on reducing recidivism and increasing housing placements among a target population.





- Deliverable 3: Implementation
 - Implement the proposed project and document outputs, including number of individuals served, in real time.
 Share progress with BJA-funded TTA provider at routine meetings.





- Deliverable 4: Final Report Due at Grant Closeout
 - Produce an evaluation that tracks recidivism, housing outcomes, and other outcomes to assess the effectiveness of their project.
 Recidivism measures must include arrest, conviction, and incarceration.





- 1. A reentry strategic plan that describes the jurisdiction's long-term reentry housing strategy
- 2. A detailed reentry implementation schedule and sustainability plan for the program
- 3. The establishment and ongoing engagement of a reentry task force





- 4. An independent evaluation of grant activities that includes, to the extent possible, random assignment and controlled studies
- 5. Evidence of collaboration with state and local government agencies such as housing, homeless services, health, mental health, local law enforcement, etc.





6. Consideration of the role of state corrections departments, parole and probation agencies, and local jail corrections systems in ensuring successful reentry in their communities. Applications must include letters of support from corrections officials responsible for people who will be served through this program.





- 7. Explicit support of the chief executive officer of the applicant unit of government or Indian tribe and how this office will remain informed and connected to the activities of the program
- 8. Understanding of evidence-based methods and outcome measures that will be used to evaluate the program





SCA Mandatory Requirements for Smart Reentry

- Description of how the program or strategy could be scaled up or broadly replicated if demonstrated to be effective
- 10. A plan to analyze the statutory, regulatory, rules-based, and practice-based hurdles to reentry





Additional Application Components

- Letters of Support Applicants should include, for each named supporting entity, a signed letter of support that outlines the supporting entity's reasons for supporting for the project
- Memorandums of Understanding (MOUs) Applicants should include for each named
 partner, a signed Memorandum of
 Understanding (MOU), letter of intent, or
 subcontract that confirms the partner's
 agreement to support the project





Review Criteria

Applications that meet the basic minimum requirements will be evaluated by peer reviewers on:

Statement of the Problem/Description of the Issue (25%) Project Design and Implementation (35%) Capabilities and Competencies (15%) Plan for Collecting the Data Required for this Solicitation's Performance Measures (5%) Budget (5%) Impact/Outcomes, Evaluation, Sustainability (15%)

▲ SAM.gov Entity Validation Update ℰ

GSA implemented a new process to validate an entity's legal business name and physical address when requesting a Unique Entity Identifier (UEI) and for completing a SAM.gov entity registration. Due to a high volume of requests, entity validations are taking longer than expected to process. This validation process is now taking 7-10 business days, and in some cases

OJP strongly recommends starting your SAM.gov registration process as soon as possible to allow the time necessary to process entity validations well in advance of the Grants.gov due date posted in the solicitation. Read this FAQ for more information.

Some OJP programs may have program solicitations that expressly modify a provision of this Guide; in such cases, the applicant is to follow the guidelines in the solicitation as to any such expressly modified provision.



- Step 2: Submit the full application, with attachments, at <u>JusticeGrants.usdoj.gov</u>.

NOTE: Submission deadline times for both Grants.gov and JustGrants are now 8:59 p.m. ET, not 11:59 p.m. ET as in past years.
